

MR. JAMES E. PEASE

Mr. James E. Pease is in his 17th year as superintendent of School District No. 102 located in LaGrange, after having served in the same capacity for 10 years in the Muskegon, Michigan school system.

He was a member of the Michigan Educational Legislation Committee, and has been a member of the Illinois Education Association for the last 11 years. Mr. Pease is past president (1952-53) of this organization.

He is chairman of the Legislation Committee of the Illinois Association of School Administration, and president of the Superintendent's Round Table of Northern Illinois. He recently has been requested by the U.S. Government to aid in setting up a military education program.

Mr. Pease has been active in all Illinois school legislation passed in the last 12 years. He is well qualified to speak on this subject, as indicated by his background and by the 1000-odd talks he has given on this subject.

His talk will deal with the organization and financing of our school system, as well as recent and proposed school legislation. The talk will be followed by a discussion period.
