A professional organization such as A.I.Ch.E. must have new members to give it vigor and continued life, but at the same time standards must be preserved. Fortunately, the stream of applications for Institute membership has mounted steadily over the years, reaching a new high — in 1957, when approximately 2,200 applications for membership and affiliate membership were presented. Depending on the disposition of his application, a prospective member may feel admission to the Institute is routine or exasperating. Sometimes requests are made for additional information by references; sometimes application for a different grade is suggested to the candidate, and occasionally membership is denied. In 1957, of 555 applications for membership, there were 37 denials.

Applications for membership are handled by the Admissions Committee of the Institute, a group which attempts to maintain certain prescribed standards of membership, recognizing the need for a constantly growing membership. This committee is a group of approximately 20 members, meeting in New York City once a month to examine each individual application for each grade of membership. Each application is examined in detail by at least three members of the committee, while the committee is in general session. If all three agree the application meets the standards of admission requirements for the grade requested, it is presented to the entire group for approval. The entire committee then reviews the application with a detailed resume before each member. If all is in order, the application is approved. If additional information is necessary, the secretary is directed to request additional information from either applicant or references, in order that the application can be processed at a future meeting. It is emphasized that each application receives the detailed attention of the committee along with the supporting references, both academic and industrial.

Although the committee meets in New York City, every attempt is made to include members from other parts of the country. Those committee members living more than 250 miles from New York City are expected to attend at least three meetings a year in order that their work with the committee can be effective. It is customary to maintain the same members on the committee for a number of years since it takes time to get sufficiently acquainted with the admission requirements, that abnormalities can be spotted in an application. Committee is a dedicated, hard-working group, whose difficulties can be recognized when it is realized that it is sometimes caught between the cross fire of those who wish to maintain high standards of admission to the Institute and those who want to increase the membership roll by relaxing requirements.

The two questions that most frequently arise in regard to a member-ship application are involved with the words "engaged" and "years of responsible charge". The term "engaged" refers to the engagement of an engineer in chemical engineering as officially defined, at the time of application. The situation frequently arises where a man is graduated from college in Chemical Engineering but gets far afield with some other activity and decides he wants to join the Institute on a full member basis. Lower grades of membership permit entrance and the Institute without being engaged in some acceptable phase of chemical engineering, but full membership status requires that the applicant be so engaged. Frequently this becomes a knotty problem when the applicant is a well known individual in some scientific pursuit other than chemical engineering.

The other thing causing difficulty is "years of responsible charge". The number of years required is dependent on the educational background of the applicant. It does not mean responsible charge for conducting a student tour to Europe, as an example, but individual professional responsibility for important work in chemical engineering. This is an area where additional information is sometimes required of both references and applicants in order to establish the degree of responsible charge claimed.

Applications are examined in detail by the entire Admissions Committee, whose attitude is one of sympathetic examination consistent with the standards of membership of the Institute. The committee is not hard boiled, but it has a definite responsibility to maintain standards and conformity with established practice. No application is processed by an office clerk with a rubber stamp. Each receives careful consideration by the entire committee, all of whom are mature individuals of understanding and long experience in industrial or academic pursuits.
