
APRIL MEETING



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THE IEC AND GEC - WHAT ARE THEY?

In the March Newsletter, Chairman George Bailie mentioned the participation of the Section and its members in the Illinois Engineering Council (IEC) and in the General Education Committee (GEC) of the Chicago Engineering Societies. Perhaps you wondered just what was the purpose of these groups and how your Section fitted into the picture.

In 1938, IEC was created as a federation of the principal engineering societies in Illinois to have one organization that could represent the engineering profession.

The basic purpose of IEC is to provide a means of bringing to bear the united effort of all organized segments of the engineering profession on any matters of general interest to the engineering profession and the public welfare, where such united action is necessary to achieve the desired results. It is not the purpose of IEC to engage in or develop activities which a member society of the Council can effectively perform without prejudice to the best interests of the entire profession.

The most important committee of IEC is the Legislative Committee who studies in detail all legislative bills which may affect, directly or indirectly, the engineering profession. It has initiated legislation including the present Illinois Professional Engineering Act and its amendments.

Membership of IEC consists of twenty member societies consisting of state and local professional engineering groups. The Chicago Section of AIChE is represented by four directors and it pays dues to help underwrite the activities of IEC.

The General Education Committee (GEC) of the Chicago Technical Societies consists of representatives of eight engineering groups: AIEE, ASCE, ASME, IRE, AIME, Western Society of Engineers, Illinois Society of Professional Engineers, and, of course AIChE. This committee offers courses of general educational value, designed to meet the special needs of engineers. Also, evening programs of educational institutions in the Chicago area are given publicity. The entire program is made possible through the cooperation and the combined efforts of the participating engineering societies and major industrial corporations. The latter group furnishes central meeting places for some of the classes. (Cont. on Page 5)

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Twice each year, late summer and winter, you receive a bulletin from GEC listing evening school courses which are available. The most recent bulletin listed courses in administrative problems for engineers, effective writing for engineering, investment programs for engineers, rapid reading, and refresher courses for the Illinois Professional Engineering Examination. The Section cooperates with GEC by addressing the mailing notices to Section members describing the courses offered.
