#### ABOUT THE SPEAKER

The speaker for the December 9 meeting is Maurice B. Mitchell, president of Encyclopaedia Britannica Films, Inc., the pioneer organization in the production of sound motion pictures for educational use, with headquarters in Wilmette, Illinois.

He directs the activities of an organization of 250 specialists, engaged in the production and distribution of educational motion pictures and film strips in all parts of the globe.

Mr. Mitchell has spent his entire working life in the communications field, although he is currently active, at the community and national level, in fields of broader interest. He began his career as a newspaperman, associated with such daily newspapers as The New York Times and the Gannett group of newspapers in New York State, and served also as the editor of a one-man country weekly.

He entered the broadcasting field after service in World War II, joining the Columbia Broadcasting System in Washington, D. C., where he managed the 50,000-watt WTOP. Later he spent several years with the National Association of Broadcasters, founded the Broadcast Advertising Bureau, and was associated with NBC. He was later associated with the Muzak Corporation, as a vice-president.

Mr. Mitchell joined Encyclopaedia Britannica Films, Inc., in 1953 and has taken a position of active leadership in the field of new techniques in education. With extensive teaching, writings and platform appearances in subjects related to new media of communication in education, he served as representative of the educational film field at UNESCO Conferences on International Exchange of New Media held at Tangier in 1955 and Paris in 1956. He was elected vice-chairman of both Conferences and acted as chairman of several key committees. He testified in behalf of the audio-visual field before committees of the House and Senate prior to passage by Congress in 1958 of the National

Defense Education Act. His leadership in these fields was recognized by the University of Denver, which awarded him the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws in 1958.

Under Mr. Mitchell's direction, Encyclopaedia Britannica Films in recent years has taken a position of leadership in pioneering the advanced use of films to solve some of the critical problems of science education. Best known of these are two complete science courses on film — introductory physics and chemistry—the first of their kind and now widely used in this country and abroad.

In 1958 Mr. Mitchell was elected a member of The Board of Trustees of the Committee for Economic Development, regarded as the principal organization of business leaders in the field of public policy. He is an Associate of the National College of Education (Evanston, Illinois), a Director of the Wilmette State Bank, and serves also as a Director of the Fund for Perceptually Handicapped Children.

He is a member of the Board of Directors of the Encyclopaedia Britannica as well as Encyclopaedia Britannica Films, and is Chairman of the Board of Films, Inc., an EBF subsidiary.
